

Later in the month, Maestro Alberto Massimo and the Edinburgh Chamber Orchestra made their annual visit, presenting a Summer Baroque Concert with works by Boyce, Avison and Stanley. In August, the church became an Edinburgh Festival Fringe venue for two concerts. The Marian Consort performed A Glory to our Race, and a Nightingale to Our People, featuring music from one of the

heavy rain curtailing some of the day's planned events, the Junger Chor Hünshoven, a nonprofessional church choir, aged 16-55, gave an enthusiastic and memorable evening concert with a programme of contemporary church music as well as gospel and popular music. in September when the church hosted two concerts during Lammermuir Festival. Started ten years ago, and held predominantly in venues across East Lothian, the Festival now has an enviable reputation for outstanding musical events. The Crichton Trustees and Festival artistic directors, Hugh **Macdonald and James Waters** have long expressed a desire to use the fine acoustic of the church and its setting in the Tyne valley, as an ideal location for the Festival. This was finally achieved when Quatuor Mosaïques, one of the world's leading period instrument string quartets, performed the first concert, with works by Haydn and Beethoven. Then, a few days later, the internationally acclaimed Dunedin Consort, performed Bach's Brandenburg Concerto No. 6 together with works by Handel and Vivaldi. Both concerts were sold out and lived up to the Festival's aim of delivering Beautiful Music in Beautiful Places. We look forward to their return in 2020.

SERVICES

The services began with an evening Communion on Easter Day conducted by Reverend Dale London. The choir and congregation of St. Peter's Episcopal Church, Lutton Place in Edinburgh made their regular visit for an Ascension Day Eucharist in May. The local Tyne Valley Parish held a United Service in June. In October, there

was a Harvest Thanksgiving service with a traditional display of produce including a harvest sheaf made by the local bakery, Albert Wahlberg & Sons.

The Service of Remembrance held on Armistice Day was conducted by the Very Reverend Dr John Cairns. It was also the final time we were privileged to have Sir Robert Clerk Bt. OBE, in his official capacity as Lord-Lieutenant of Midlothian, lay a wreath on behalf of Her Majesty the Queen. Sir Robert is due to retire from his post in 2020.

Carols at Crichton, with around one hundred and twenty attending, was held in December on the second Sunday in Advent. We are grateful to Reverend Robert Simpson for so ably leading this service.

The funeral of Leslie Andrews took place in October. His grandfather, William Findlay had been the custodian of Crichton Castle in the 1950's.

There were four weddings held during the year and one christening.
