A Challenging Time...

he last two years have been a challenging time for us all, as we have had to deal with the Covid-19 pandemic. March 2020 saw lockdown and a complete cancellation of the Trust's activities. It was particularly difficult for couples planning to get married in the church. Carefully laid plans had to be altered, with dates being postponed, in some cases more than once. As the months passed there was a gradual easing of restrictions. This allowed weddings and funerals to take place, although with limited numbers on those permitted to attend. There was only one service, on Armistice Day, led by Professor **Herbert A. Kerrigan QC**. We were also able to continue with

the external maintenance of the church fabric. Edinburgh Stonemasons carried out essential work to the masonry and roof of the vestry and north transept.

During 2021, with further relaxation of restrictions, we were able to hold a Tyne Valley Parish service, a Service of Remembrance and Carols at Crichton. A concert with the Roxburgh Quartet was held in August, the first time they had been able to perform for eighteen months. The Lammermuir Festival returned for a Trumpet and Organ concert in September with **Aaron Akugbo** and **John Kitchen.** Aaron had performed at Crichton some years ago as a member of the St Mary's Music School Brass Ensemble with John Kenny. It was a triumphant return for him. John, who is the Edinburgh City organist, was delighted with the Brook organ. Again, numbers attending

all these events were restricted in line with government guidelines. September also saw Midlothian Doors Open Day return as a physical rather than a virtual event.

Delphian Records and Pentatone, a company based in the Netherlands, were able to record a number of musicians in the church, including Sean Shibe, Alexandra Whittingham, Bojan Cicic, Helen Charlston and Toby Carr.

Sadly, we have lost a number of longstanding Friends and supporters, among them our church beadle, **Graham Meikle**. A retired surgeon, Graham took great pleasure in the role of Crichton beadle. He enjoyed the wide variety of services, events and concerts, particularly when the organ was being played. His funeral service was held in the church and he is buried in the graveyard where a fine memorial stone has been erected.


